

Oxymorphone is a potent opioid analgesic used to relieve moderate to severe pain when alternative treatments are inadequate. It is available in immediate-release and extended-release (ER) formulations; ER is generally reserved for patients already on a stable regimen of strong opioids for chronic pain. Oxymorphone is classified as a Schedule II controlled substance in the U.S. due to its high potential for abuse and addiction.

As of 2025, prescribing oxymorphone requires adherence to strict state and federal regulations including thorough patient assessment, dosage and duration limits, and informed consent that discusses risks such as dependency and overdose. Prescribers must complete continuing education on opioid prescribing and use prescription drug monitoring programs (PDMPs) to oversee patient use.

Electronic prescribing of Schedule II opioids, including oxymorphone, is allowed but requires prescriber DEA certification and compliance with telehealth laws. Pharmacies dispensing oxymorphone must verify prescriptions and provide secure, confidential delivery following controlled substance regulations.

Due to safety concerns, the extended-release branded formulation Opana ER was withdrawn in 2017 at FDA request, though generic oxymorphone formulations remain available under strict oversight.

In summary, buying oxymorphone online with secure delivery is legal only with a valid prescription from a licensed healthcare provider who follows opioid prescribing guidelines, dispensed by certified pharmacies adhering to stringent regulations ensuring patient safety and medication authenticity.
